The opening act was Vieux Farka Toure. You say who's that? Well he is the son of the late and very great Malian blues guitarist Ali Farka Toure. Some of you are still saying, "well, who is he"? If you saw the movie "Unfaithful" with Richard Gere, you heard Ali Farka's music during the first romantic encounter, yeah that real slow sexy song.

Vieux Farka's guitar playing is reminiscent of his father's (*vieux* meaning "old man" in French) but he has a style all his own. He mixes traditional Malian music with reggae and funk. In honor of his father's memory, he played two of his songs and wore his dad's signature brown hat.

Between songs, Vieux Farka tried to speak to the audience in English but he had to keep asking his drummer how to say things. I don't know if the drummer is American but he speaks English. It was cute the way they interacted with each other. Nevertheless, we understood what he tried to say. When their set was done, they got a standing ovation and of course, came back on stage to play one more song. This group is just starting out. I think they will do very well.

Next the stage transformed into soft hues of orange, red and yellow lighting, Tinariwen began playing their music and we were off on a trip to the desert. We missed Ibrahim and Mina, who we did not see this time, but there is a new member Abdallah AG Lamida who was amazing doing vocals and lead guitar. We have seen Tinariwen each of their four visits to the USA, twice in Washington, DC and twice in New York. This time they performed many new songs that we had not heard. Their latest CD, AMAN IMAN: WATER IS LIFE, we play in the store each and every day, over and over and over. We have their other CD's as well (all available for sale).

Hassan AG Agtouhami did his signature solo dance that is very energetic. It seems he can go on forever. Abdallah AG Alhousseyni, lead vocalist and guitarist, was as smooth as ever. Said AG Ayad played the djembe did not miss a beat. Eyadou, bass guitarist, did some dancing Tuareg style and later some of Tinariwen's entourage jumped up on the stage and joined him.
